DIAGNOSING BREAST CHANGES WITH A BIOPSY

A breast biopsy is a procedure to remove a sample of breast cells or tissue, or an entire lump. A pathologist then looks at the sample under a microscope to check for signs of disease. A biopsy is the only way to find out if cells are cancer. Print out and take this list of questions with you when you talk with your health care provider.
